About the Crawford Art Gallery's Meat and Potatoes Project Space

Meat and Potatoes has been the Crawford Art Gallery's food-themed art exhibition running from July 16th to November 4th. The downstairs gallery showed artworks with food as a theme, while upstairs the project space has seen a big, ambitious programme of food-related events including a live baking workshop, a seed swap, April Gertler's Take The Cake and a crop of gallery-grown spuds which were harvested and cooked as colcannon in the gallery. About Green Towers

<u>Green Towers Ireland</u> was founded by Jenny Twomey and Jill O'Brien in 2019 to import aeroponic growing systems known as Green Towers into Ireland. The growing systems first tested by NASA in the 1990s have been marketed and sold in the US for 15 years and are suitable both for domestic use and in "tower farms" where fresh herbs and leaves can be grown direct for food businesses in minimal space and with minimal water use.

Dr Barbara Doyle Prestwich is Head of Plant Science & Principal Investigator in the <u>School of Biological Earth and Environmental Science</u> in UCC. She is a Plant Biotechnologist whose broad research interests include the use of biotechnology for sustainable agriculture, crop improvement and the use of plants for the production of medicinal compounds incorporating principles and tasks highlighted in the European Green Deal, particularly in the Farm to Fork Strategy and the UN Sustainable Development Goals. and runs a number of outreach activities which opens science up to a broad audience.

Crawford Art Gallery is an Irish national cultural institution, dedicated to contemporary and historic visual art, located in a significant heritage building in the heart of Cork city.
