There is a legend that St Patrick banished all of the snakes from Ireland.


A few snakes have slithered their way back into the Gallery, can you help us find them?

Detail of main staircase, c. 1884



Can you find this painting by Noreen Spillane, in the Other Worlds exhibition on the top Floor?


Faeries have always held a strong place in Irish mythology.
